

Crudwell Defibrillator Access

THE WHEATSHEAF Inn has a community access defibrillator on the outside of the pub. It is in a locked cabinet. In an emergency, the 999 ambulance service will tell you where the nearest defibrillator is and the code for the cabinet lock if you live in the qualifying area. The cabinet lock code is available to anyone requesting it and at anytime from the Wheatsheaf Inn. We suggest that you contact us directly for the code so you can have it available should you ever need it. Ring 01666 577739 for details.

The defibrillator can be used by anyone as no training is required. However, familiarisation is available by prior arrangement. For further help gaining access to the defibrillator, you may ring the Wheatsheaf day or night.

Crudwell Jubilee Celebrations

THE FOUR-DAY weekend to celebrate this year's Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II will be marked in Crudwell by a number of events between $2^{nd} - 5^{th}$ June.

Ideas so far include street parties, a musical evening featuring local singers and musicians, a village quiz night, a flower festival in the church and a classic car display. These are only ideas and are by no means complete nor set in stone. More ideas are not only wanted but needed.

The Parish Council is offering to hold a street party with music and food on the village green outside the school on Saturday 4th June for residents from The Street and others who are not attending a party elsewhere. The Primary School will also be arranging activities to support this and other Jubilee events.

It is anticipated that other areas of Crudwell such as Gooselands, Tetbury Lane, Tuners Lane etc may want to get together with their neighbours at their own street parties. Go ahead but do let the council know in plenty of time.

The Parish Council is acting as the umbrella group under which the Jubilee will be celebrated in Crudwell and has access to some funds available centrally, but funding will depend on the events being considered suitable as a Jubilee community event. Roy Lambley, vice-chair of the council, is the councillor acting as co-ordinator.

Any event will, of course, require someone or a group of people to organise it and also lots of people to support it when the time comes. It is likely that soon everyone in the village will be asked for a little help. The more people who are prepared to make a contribution of time, talent or expertise the more likely it is that the whole village will enjoy a sensational and satisfying Jubilee weekend.

One thing is certain, Crudwell will as ever, rise to the occasion and live up to its reputation as one of the best places in Wiltshire to live.

The number of infections in Malmesbury, Crudwell and Oaksey was, at 679 cases per 100,000 as at 11th February, again above the national average. As most of you will be aware the Strawberry Fayre raises essential funds for the upkeep of our lovely church building and most will know too that this will be the third year in a row that it has not taken place. However, the four days of the Jubilee weekend will raise money for village organisations, including the church, and the Open Gardens last year went some way towards making up the Strawberry Fayre shortfall.

And the good news is that after such a long gap next year's Strawberry Fayre – to be held on 8th and 9th July 2023 – will be a very special one which we are sure will be massively supported and hugely enjoyed.

Neighbourhood Plan Report

Neighbourhood Plan Review

A STEERING Group workshop took place on 15th February during which we commenced work on defining the scope of the Plan Review to extend the Plan to 2036. Two new Steering Group members were co-opted to help with the work plan.

Immediate tasks are to redefine the Vision and Objectives of the 2021 'made' Plan to align with the requirements of the review and to develop an outline plan for the new work streams. This will allow the effort and technical support needed to deliver the Review to be estimated. The Steering Group will seek the PC's formal support for the Review and, if approval is granted, seek funding for the Review by way of Government grants.

As with the current 'made' Neighbourhood Plan, you will be consulted and involved at all the appropriate stages of the process in orderly ensure that the Review fully reflects the wishes of the Crudwell community. The Review is very important as when completed it will help prevent large speculative planning applications from developers while Wiltshire Council continues to have a housing supply deficit. This will enable us in Crudwell to continue to ensure that future developments in the village are at a sustainable scale, affordable and designed to harmonise with the village scene.

No further update this month as we are waiting for the Tuners Lane site promotors to report back to us with their latest revised design and site layout proposals. We will keep you informed of progress towards their planning application.






