

Parish Council and Community Report Nov 24

Community Support

The Parish Council is very pleased to be able to support the relaunch of WOIC this month, we feel that it is a vital communications link for the parish which has been missed by us all over the past year. The Council has agreed to actively sponsor and manage the financing of the journal going forward to ensure that publication can continue. We are most grateful to our previous editor, Heather Kerboul, our new editor, Katie Hawkins and to our distribution lead, Charlotte Bullock, for making the relaunch possible.

Many thanks also to those of you who assisted with our After WOIC focus group and to those who responded to the WOIC survey in September.

- 450 flyers of the questionnaire were circulated by the WOIC distribution team.
- 93 households responded to the survey online.
- A further 10 flyers were completed on paper and have been appended to the spreadsheet.

The results of the survey show that there is overwhelming support for the relaunch. Following the closing date I have collated the results as follows:

- 145 respondents would favour a reintroduction of WOIC, 3 said no. (98% Yes 2% No)
- 61 respondents stated that they wanted a paper copy
- 88 Respondents stated that a paper copy wasn't needed
- 9 respondents stated that they absolutely needed a paper copy because they couldn't access the internet or had accessibility needs
- 26 respondents stated that they would prefer a paper copy, but I could access an electronic copy if it contributed to the viability of the project
- 67 respondents stated that they would be perfectly happy with an electronic copy delivered via email or messaging app.
- It is understood that the majority of Chelworth residents would prefer the journal to be delivered (44 paper copies).

Discussions with the distribution team lead have concluded that it would be extremely difficult to deliver to some addresses and not to others. The Parish Council therefore agreed that this initial copy will be delivered to all residents, also to provide an opt out sticker for display for those who do not wish to receive a paper copy. The journal will not be delivered in future where this is displayed. If you would like an opt out sticker then please email woicrudwell@gmail.com. 

Neighbourhood Plan Report Nov 24

It has been some time since we reported progress on the Crudwell Neighbourhood Plan via this journal so by way of an update, I will summarise progress as follows.

The Crudwell Neighbourhood Plan was "made" (completed and included in Wiltshire Council Local Plan) in May 2021. This gives us protection from speculative planning applications for unwanted developments for five years.

The 2021 Plan allocated a site in Tuners Lane for 25 new homes and a planning application for these remains "called in" by Councillor Berry following the PC's objections to the proposed housing designs. There is no published date for the committee meeting where this will be an agenda item. The Plan detailed a number of other policies including a Design Guide. The Plan can be found at: https://www.my-crudwell.org/plan/

In 2023 the Parish Council agreed to commence a review of the 2021 plan to align with the emerging Wiltshire Local Plan which will state Wiltshire's housing requirements to 2038. We formally consulted with you on aspects of the Plan Review during March 2023 and a working group has been developing the findings into our next formal consultation called Regulation 14. In order to be a valid review, the new plan must include a material change i.e. a further housing allocation for development by 2038. In this respect we made a call for sites and have been in discussion with those landowners who responded. The new Plan Review includes a number of other areas of policy which were omitted from the 2021 plan for expediency. These new policy areas include:

- o Proposed Protected Green Spaces Policy.
- o The Green Network and Hedgerow Policies.
- o Business Park Policies.
- o Business Development Policies.
- o Additional Parking Facilities Policy aimed to ease congestion at the Primary School.
- o A new Design Guide to meet government requirements.

Our plan, which is governed and developed by the Parish Council, a Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group and a Working Group of volunteer councillors and other residents, also includes a number of technical documents, including a sustainability appraisal and SEA Screening Assessment. The plan team is therefore supplemented by planning consultants, who are largely funded by government grants.

As always with a change in Government, there are changes in central planning policy and our plan is currently being reviewed in the light of a new Government Planning Framework which may affect our local requirement for new housing. At present, our housing requirement in the emerging Wiltshire Local Plan is minimal.

We are pleased to be able to continue to consult with you again at all stages of the new plan's development via this journal and formal consultations, the next of which is Regulation 14.

Greetings from Crudwell Church

We know we are already coming up to the time of year when giving-and-receiving is the order of the day! Something we've noticed since our arrival here, though, is that the time of year really doesn't matter in the Braydon Brook benefice – giving is in your DNA. I've lost track of the times we've come home to find a gift on the doorstep: a brace of pheasants hanging from the lintel, a jar of home-made jam on the step, a posy or several long stems of flowers laid across a pot wrapped in water... and then all the fund-raising events, carefully and expertly planned and the quiet, kindly visiting that goes on taking cakes and tarts and pots of warm soup.

What a blessing!!

Reading the story of Jesus talking to the Samaritan woman — which is a stonking story in John 4 — we see that it is precisely about giving and receiving. Jesus arrives at a well on the outskirts of a town which lies outside of his heritage boundaries and the limits of cultural acceptance for his people. He meets a woman who has come to draw water — alone, by virtue of her outcast status within her own outcast community.

She is doubly shunned. Culture apart, as a woman, she is stunned when Jesus – a man - engages her in conversation. And he does so by asking her for a drink. He wants to give her something really important – Living Water – but he begins by seeking her help:

'Will you give me a drink?'

What Jesus does with this question is 'make himself vulnerable to her to call out her goodness. He recognises and awakens this truth about her — that she is made in the image of God, she is a God-bearer in the world' and that she can meet this ordinary human need with her kindness.

We are all familiar with the Acts 20:35 statement, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive', but this story suggests that as blessed as it is to give, those who receive are also blessing the giver and the whole act of giving-and-receiving opens up spaces for God in the life of both the giver and the receiver — the space for us to receive from Christ his wonderful Living Water and to be a conduit for that Life-giving stream into the lives of those around us.
